From the City Manager Brandon M. Lovett

It's that time of year again when summer winds down, the kids head back to school, and the crisp air of fall begins to arrive. The City had a very busy and productive

summer and we expect the next several weeks to be the same. The DPW building renovation project is on schedule to wrap up before winter settles in. Our street paving project as well as the binder course for the Power and Light building will be completed in the next few weeks. New sidewalk installation at various locations throughout the City has begun, and the completion of the Betsinger Road sidewalk project is near. The City worked closely with the NYS DOT. They'll be installing a new crosswalk on Route 5 at Betsinger to complete the project. This enhancement will provide two crossing points on Route 5 for pedestrians in the City.

As a recap, our fireworks weekend was a huge success based on the feedback from our residents, visitors and vendors. If you have any suggestions or comments you'd like to share with us for next year's event please contact Sara Getman in the Recreation Department. We'd love to hear from you.

I've been working with the City Commission on updating several ordinances including the Green Waste and Refuse Ordinances and we expect to roll out the changes very soon. The updates will streamline the collection process for our DPW crews, and we feel they will better serve the public.

As mentioned in the last newsletter two significant economic development projects are underway in the City. The new Maple Leaf Market on the corner of Sherrill Road and Route 5 is expected in open in September. And just two weeks ago Briggs & Stratton made the formal announcement that they are repurposing approximately 575,000 square feet of a former Oneida Limited building as their new home. Briggs & Stratton plans to manufacture zero-turn radius and commercial mowers under the Ferris and Snapper Pro brands, and homeowner zero-turn mowers under its Simplicity and Snapper names out of the new facility. It's an exciting time for Sherrill and we wish both businesses success in the years ahead.

I'd like to congratulate the Sherrill Legion Post 230 baseball team on their District 5 Championship and the Sherrill Silversmiths of the NYCBL on a great season as well. Also, a huge thank you to all the vendors who participated in our

farmers market this year, as well as the bands who performed in our concert series. The summer weather had its ups and downs, but overall it was a success. And a special thank you to all our City Departments and staff who work hard to make these events/programs possible.

We have begun the process of compiling information for the 2018 Budget, and we will be working collaboratively as a team in the months ahead as we develop next year's budget. A focus of the 2018 budget will be to address some of our most needed infrastructure, facility and equipment improvements to better position ourselves for the future. The City will be hosting a Fall Touch a Truck event at the CAC on Columbus Day from 10am-1pm. The event will feature large trucks and equipment for all to view and touch. Vendors with concessions and some additional activities will be available too.

Lastly, The City of Sherrill is losing one of its finest, as Patrolman Daniel Slator has resigned with Sherrill Police Department, to accept a position with City of Oneida Police Department. The City of Sherrill's loss is truly the City of Oneida's gain. On behalf of the City of Sherrill, I'd like to say, "Thank you" to Officer Slator for your service, and the entire Sherrill community wishes you the best in your new position.

Department of Public Works News

Projects- The DPW has completed this year's major roadwork and most sidewalk improvements and already begun working on improving the underground utilities for next year's street improvements. Other work planned for this season includes athletic field improvements and sitework at the CAC, Power & Light, and the DPW Garage.

Summer Help- Thank you to Tyler Baker, Matt Nell, and Trevor Esch for their hard work in making the City look great this summer. From painting to landscaping, they did it all!

Upcoming Garbage Pick-Up Date Change- Garbage pickup scheduled for Friday November 10 will take place Thursday November 9.

Common Garbage & Recycling Mistakes

Overweight- Garbage can & contents shall not weigh over 40 lbs (recyclables 20 lbs). Tip: place used cat litter in separate plastic bag outside of garbage container to avoid having container be overweight.

Size- Containers shall be no less than 10 gal. & no more than 32 gal.

<u>Damaging Items</u>- Construction debris & oversized items are not accepted.

<u>Plastic Bags</u>- Bags <u>cannot</u> be recycled via the local recycling program. Bags can be brought to most local grocery stores for recycling/reuse.

<u>Food Contents</u>- Remove food and & rinse out containers for recycling. For more tips please visit <u>www.AmIRecyclable.com</u>

Transfer Station- Thanks to Transfer Station Manager Michelle Finn for making the Transfer Station a well-oiled machine! The Transfer Station is open Wednesdays, 4-7pm & Saturdays, 8am-1pm through October 4. Beginning October 7, it will only be open Saturdays until spring. Disposal coupons must be purchased at City Hall prior to dropping off items.

Free Paper Shredding & Bulk Plastic Collection- Sherrill residents are invited to bring any paper they need shredded to the Transfer Station on Saturday, September 30th, from 10am-12pm. No need to remove paper clips or staples. Folders & envelopes are also acceptable. Residents are also invited to drop off bulky plastics (garbage cans, plastic toys, lawn furniture, etc).

Remaining Brush & Green Waste Pick-Up Dates- 9/11, 9/25, 10/9, & 10/23. After 10/23, residents can bring brush & green waste to the Transfer Station at no charge.

Leaves- The City will pick up leaves as the weather dictates. *Leaf piles shall:* be just leaves- no garbage, soil, rocks, animal waste, lumber, debris, branches, etc- failure to comply will potentially result in severe damage to the leaf vacuum system; <u>not</u> be bagged, placed in any type of container, or left on tarps/plastic; be placed at curb-<u>not in roadway</u>.

Lawn Care Tips- Mulching leaves back into the lawn benefits lawn quality and color and is better for the biodiversity and organic matter of the soil. Mulched sugar maple leaves inhibit broadleaf weed seeds like dandelion.

Compost & Ashes- Compost is available for residents to take at the end of Fairway Lane, adjacent to the Waste Water Treatment Plant. There is also a designated area to drop off properly extinguished, wood ashes.

Our swimming pool is open during the summer months when Robertson Park is being used the most extensively and all of our pool staff have CPR and AED certification.

SOS Technologies of Chicago has already helped Sherrill employees learn about the features of the device and will continue to be a resource for support. NOTICE

Over the last several months the City's Zoning Regulations have been discussed in great length, in particular Section 23- Signs. It has been brought to the City's attention that there are many cases where the sign regulations have not been

adequately enforced. Effective October 1, 2017 the City will increase its efforts on enforcement of the City's Zoning Regulations as adopted on April 27, 2015. Any signs that do not have the proper permitting will be removed. If you are displaying any signs on your property, kindly review the zoning regulation to comply with your City's efforts. Below please find an overview of Zoning Regulation; Section 23. Please contact City Hall with any questions. Thank you for doing your part to keep Sherrill a wonderful place to live.

<u>Sherrill Zoning Regulations: Section 23 – Signs</u> It is the purpose and intent of this section to promote and protect the public health, welfare and safety by regulating existing and proposed outdoor signs of all types; to protect property values; to create a more attractive and economic business climate; to enhance and to protect the physical appearance of the community; to reduce sign and advertising distraction and obstructions that may contribute to traffic accidents; to reduce hazards that may be caused by signs occupying, overhanging or projecting into the public right of way; to provide more open space and to curb the deterioration of the community development.

No sign shall be erected or maintained in the City except in compliance with the provisions of this section.

A "temporary sign" is a sign which is freestanding or otherwise not permanently attached to a building or to a post or other structure permanently erected on the premises and is not otherwise described and permitted in Section 23 of the Sign Ordinance.

Temporary signs shall require a permit; such permit shall expire Five (5) days after the event advertised has concluded or in any case shall expire 90 days after issuance thereof. Permits for such signs shall not be reissued within a given calendar year and in no event shall such permit authorize more than one sign.

In the event such temporary sign has not been removed upon expiration of the permit, the Code Enforcement Officer shall cause that sign to be removed, the cost of which is to be charged to the applicant by deducting the same from the deposit.

Dimensions. No such temporary sign shall be larger than thirty-two (32) square feet and shall not exceed twenty (20) feet above ground level in any business or industrial district or four (4) square feet in area and shall not exceed four (4) feet above ground level when placed in any residential district.

The "placement" of a temporary sign shall not be attached to fences, trees or utility poles and shall not be placed in a position that obstructs or impairs vision of traffic or creates a hazard or nuisance.

A temporary sign requires a "permit". A permit fee of \$10 shall be paid by the applicant upon the issuance of a permit for a temporary sign; and in addition, thereto, the Code Enforcement Officer shall require a deposit of \$100, and it shall be refundable upon timely removal as hereinafter provided.

Signs not affected are those signs endorsing any candidate for political office or indicating support of or opposition to any political proposition during the sixty (60) days immediately preceding the date on which such election is to be taken or vote is to be held and seven (7) days immediately thereafter. No such sign shall contain obscene or vulgar language to disturb the peace and character of the neighborhood. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to prohibit the display of any holiday decoration, including flashing lights.



History News

In honor of the 100th anniversary of World War 1 we're including this poem written by local soldier Peter F. Laing while in Germany, representative of the war. He was decorated with the French Cross and was reported to be the first Sherrill soldier to achieve distinction for special valor in fighting with American forces in France.

We Have Done Our Bit

I am sitting here and thinking, of the things I left behind
And I hate to put on paper what is running through my mind
We have dug a million trenches and cleared miles and miles of ground
And a meaner place this side of Hell, I know cannot be found
But there is still one consolation, for we have done our hitch in Hell.

We have built a million roads, so the Huns could get our shells, We have hiked a million miles, and through the worst of Hell, We have hiked through a million gas clouds, and had the best of luck We have forded a million rushing streams – some of us got stuck The number of night we have hiked, is very hard to tell, But we will not hike in Heaven, for we have done our hitch in Hell.

We have killed a million cooties, that tried to steal our cots

And shook a hundred rats out of our Army socks,

We have marched a thousand miles and made a hundred camps

We scraped a hundred hunks of mud from off our Army pants.

But when our work on earth is done, our friends on earth will tell

Candles- An estimated 15,260 fires are caused by candles each year. Always use a flashlight for emergency lighting. NEVER leave burning candles unattended!

Wood Stoves- Wood stoves cause over 4,000 residential fires every year. The City fire code has specific installation requirements and a permit is required. Stop in at City Hall for information.

Electric Space Heaters- Buy only heaters evaluated by a nationally recognized laboratory, and check to make sure it has a thermostat control mechanism, and will switch off automatically. Always unplug your electric space heater when not in use.

Fireplaces- Fireplaces regularly build up creosote in their chimneys. They need to be cleaned frequently and chimneys should be inspected for obstructions and cracks to prevent deadly fires. Make sure fires are completely out before leaving the house or going to bed.

Remember- In the event of a fire, time is the biggest enemy and every second counts! Escape first, and then call for help. Develop a home fire escape plan and practice it frequently with your family.

Daylight savings time ends November 5remember to change the batteries in your smoke alarms when you turn your clocks back.
