From the Fire Department...

More than 4,000 people die each year in the U.S. as a result of fires. Tens of thousands more are injured. Thousands more lose pets, keepsakes and suffer trauma that haunts them for the rest of their lives. In many cases, the deaths and injuries could have been prevented by a working smoke detector, or something as simple as an escape plan which can get you and your family out quickly and save lives. Make one for your home: -Draw a floor plan.

-Label each room as a sleeping area, kitchen, living room, etc.

-Label the location of all doors and windows in each room.

-Label the location of helpful escape tools in each room such as ladders. -Label all locations of smoke detectors.

-Mark your family meeting spot, located near a distinct landmark, safely away from your home.

-Post escape plans on each level of your home, in hallways and in every sleeping area. A good rule of thumb is to make sure your family's escape plan is posted with the same frequency as your smoke detectors. -Make sure overnight guests, caretakers and/or babysitters know where escape plans are posted and review them.

Once you have your escape plan, remember:

-Practice escaping from EVERY room in the home: The best escape plans have two ways out of each room and are practiced monthly.

-IMMEDIATELY leave the home: Designate an individual to call 911 from a neighbor's home and avoid the temptation to save property.

-NEVER open doors that are too hot to the touch: Use the back of your hand to feel the top of the door, the doorknob, and the crack between the door and the door frame. If it's hot, use your secondary escape route.


-Get low: People often succumb to smoke and toxins in the air before burns. Always remember, "Bad air up, good air down. Stay low and go."

-ONCE OUT, STAY OUT! Designate a meeting place outside and take attendance. NEVER go back into the home.

-Install working smoke detectors: Make sure there are smoke alarms on each floor, in each bedroom, and in hallways if you sleep with your bedroom door closed. Replace batteries once a year, and test smoke alarms once a month.

Advanced planning will ensure that you are ready for any fire emergency and can provide you and your loved ones peace of mind. Compliments of the California Fire Foundation

Jack Stone Looks Back Over 83+ Years

On February 9, 1942 we lost Sherrill High School to a fire. It was a sad day for the students. It housed classes 7-12. I was in the 7th grade at the time and the fire started during our noon hour. I was in the gym playing basketball with some others when smoke filled one end of the court so we went to the other end. Soon after Raymond Allen came into the gym with a jacket over his head and said, "MAC wants everyone out of the school." Ray Allen entered the Air Force like many others at the time and he was lost at sea off the England coast. MAC that I referred to was our principal and loved by all. The elementary school that now sits on the site of the fire is named E.A. McAllister in his honor. For the rest of the year 7th and 8th grades were held in the basement of St. Helena's Church. High school students spent time going from class to class and building to building around town. Before school started in September the School Board and the Superintendent had figured out what to do. Kenwood Park Elementary and Willow Place Elementary merged into one at Willow Place and Kenwood Park became the high school. The CAC became our gym for all activities and home economics classes were held upstairs. The first principal at the new E.A. McAllister School was Henry Hruby followed by Donald Everhart who was the principal there for 21 vears until his retirement in 1978.

Brush & Green Waste Pick-Up- Every other Monday 4/4-10/17 *Please do not place waste at the curb prior to the weekend before the scheduled Monday pick-up.

Lawn Care Tips:

-Lawn clippings should always be left on the lawn and never raked so that the soil receives all necessary nutrients it requires.

-Use of fertilizer can be eliminated because of the natural nitrogen produced from leaving grass clippings on the lawn.

-Best benefit of all: Saving your time and energy for fun things! Brush & Green Waste Reminders:

-In wet or over-grown conditions where clumping occurs and grass clippings are brought to the curb, please keep grass/green waste separate from brush piles. DEC guidelines mandate different processing procedures for recycling brush and recycling green waste. -Brush & green waste piles shall:

-be free of any garbage, soil, rocks, animal waste, lumber, debris, inorganic matter, etc...

<u>-not</u> be placed in any type of bag, twine, basket, rope, container, wire, barrel, etc...

-be separated from each other

-Brush must be less than 6' long and 4" wide

The Board of Assessment Review will meet for Grievance Day May 17, 2-4pm and 6-8pm at City Hall to hear and examine all complaints in relation to assessments. Grievance forms may be obtained at City Hall and should be returned to the Assessor by May 16.
