From The City Manager Michael R. Sayles



I hope this letter finds you all happy and healthy and enjoying this Christmas season. Fortunately, (or unfortunately) the winter weather seems to be setting in. As we wound down the year, there was a large focus on the 2017 budget. After many meetings with department heads and City officials, and a Public Hearing, we adopted a budget that does not increase City property taxes. At the same time, we will continue to get a lot of work done around the City, purchase critical

equipment and renovate the DPW garage to bring it up to today's standards and improve its fit into the neighborhood.

I am sure that you have seen that the Public Works Department has been busy picking up leaves and completing a general fall cleanup. The weather of course has not been a great help but we are fighting through it. We did complete new paving and curbs on some important streets that were in desperate need of repair. Also, we installed more than 1,000 linear feet of new sidewalk and began the sidewalk extension project on Betsinger Road that is being paid for by a New York State grant that was awarded to the City. All this work was completed in a very compressed time-frame as the crews spent the first half of the year preparing for the centennial celebration. If you see them, thank them for all their hard work!

The Power & Light crew has been busy completing the new Power & Light Building on Elmwood Place. The facility looks great and is much more neighborhoodfriendly in appearance. Also, thanks to the crew who did a great job decorating the City for this Christmas season. On a side note, congratulations to Trevor Onyan for completing his Line Worker Training Program with a final average of 98.8%. Trevor completed the 4-year, Northeast Public Power Association (NEPPA) administered Northwest Lineman College certificate program. In addition, Trevor completed over 6,000 on-the-job training hours with our Power & Light company and is now a NYS certified Line Worker. Congratulations Trevor. We are proud of you and your accomplishments.

In addition, last month, the City hired Daniel Slator to be our new Police Department Patrolman. Dan was a Valedictorian at Stockbridge Valley and earned Bachelor and Masters degrees at Cortland College. Most recently, Dan was a parttime patrolman here and in Cazenovia. Dan is very professional with a great DPW News attitude and is a key addition to our department. Congrats Dan!

Lastly, thanks to Michael Holmes, Tricia Rossi, Beanie Zupan, Judy Hildreth, Chief Robert Drake, Rob Mumford, Kevin Mumford, Chris Bailey, Sara Getman and Greg Talbot. Without all of you and the rest of the city crews, my job would not be as Business News easy or as enjoyable.

ASSESSOR'S NEWS

MARCH 1, 2017 is the deadline for filing certain property tax exemption applications with the Assessor's office. Many exemptions including the Senior Citizen's and Enhanced STAR exemptions do not automatically renew and require annual applications and proof of qualifying income.

The Senior Citizen's exemption, with far lower income limits than the Enhanced STAR exemption, is normally based on the previous year's income. For the Senior Citizen's exemption, you must provide proof of your previous year's income. Form SS 1099 and your tax returns are needed to prove your income level. Also bring in receipts for your out-of-pocket unreimbursed medical and prescription expenses which are used to reduce your income. These expenses include dental, health insurance premium payments, eyeglasses, hearing aids and others as defined by the IRS.

To qualify for Enhanced STAR you must turn 65 during 2017 and be income eligible in 2015. Those applying for Enhanced STAR may elect to participate in a voluntary program whereby the Assessor's office is automatically notified in future years by the State regarding income eligibility. This process is only useful for those filing New York State tax returns. Applications for the Income Verification Program are available at the Assessor's office. This process cannot be used for any other incomerelated exemption including the Senior Citizen's exemption.

If you purchased a residence in Sherrill **PRIOR TO MAY 1, 2014** and have **NOT** previously applied for the Basic STAR exemption, you may qualify for this significant property tax exemption designed to lower your school tax bill. The residence must be your primary residence to qualify for Basic STAR. Renewal to continue the Basic Star exemption is NOT necessary.

**IMPORTANT STAR CHANGES: For those homeowners that purchased their property after May 1, 2014 both the Basic and Enhanced STAR programs have changed. An appointment, if more convenient, can be scheduled by contacting Bob at 264-6362. Sherrill residents can receive some of the same services that they receive from the Sherrill Assessor's Office at the Vernon Assessor's office, including assistance relating to exemption applications. The Vernon Assessor's hours are Monday & Thursday, 9am-2pm through the month of February. Call Frank Laguzza at 829-2587.

Garbage or Treasure Stat: Sherrill generates an average of 101.04 tons of refuse per month.

- *Please note- The following are some common violations that are still occurring:
- -Garbage can & contents combined total weight over 40 lbs. Please cover garbage and recyclable cans. Rainwater & snow significantly increase the weight to unsafe, handling limits for the sanitation crew.
- -Recyclables not loose, but stuffed in plastic bags. Please do not bag recyclables.
- -Bulk or hazardous items that could potentially damage truck packer or result in DEC fines.

Winter Reminder- Please do not place garbage cans or recyclables in the sidewalk because it interferes with sidewalk clearing. Please place containers at the edge of your driveway between the sidewalk and road.

Christmas Trees- The DPW will pick up trees after the holidays as weather permits or they can be dropped off anytime, at no charge at the green waste location at the DPW barn.

From the Fire Department



Fire Hydrants- Please keep the hydrants near your house clear of snow. This could save firefighters precious minutes if a structure fire should occur. Remember that the house you save could be your own.

(From New York State Winter Preparedness guide)

Fire Safety- Wood-burning stoves, fireplaces and heaters can add a cozy glow, but make sure you are using them safely.

- 1. Always keep a screen around an open flame.
- 2. Never use gasoline to start your fireplace.
- 3. Never burn charcoal indoors.
- 4. Do not close the damper when ashes are hot.
- 5. When using alternative heat sources such as a fireplace, woodstove, etc. always make sure you have proper ventilation.
- 6. Keep curtains, towels and potholders away from hot surfaces.
- 7. Have your chimney checked before the season for creosote buildup and then clean it.
- 8. Do you have a fire extinguisher and smoke detectors? Make sure they work and establish a well-planned escape route with the entire family.

Carbon Monoxide Poisoning- Carbon monoxide is a silent, deadly killer claiming about 1,000 lives each year in the United States. Automotive exhaust, home heating systems and obstructed chimneys can produce the colorless, odorless gas. The gas can also be produced by poorly vented generators, kerosene heaters, gas grills and other items used for cooking and heating.

- 1. **NEVER** run generators indoors. Open a window slightly when using a kerosene heater.
- 2. **NEVER** use charcoal to cook indoors.
- 3. **NEVER** use a gas oven to heat your home.

Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning include sleepiness, headaches and dizziness. If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning, dial 911.

Waste Water Treatment Plant Notice

Sump Pump Discharge

The City's Waste Water Treatment Plant is under a consent order from New York State to reduce storm water discharge to the Sanitary Sewer System. Part of our issue is residential and commercial sump pumps that are hooked directly to the sewer system. In order to reduce heavy water flows at the treatment plant caused by storm events or a very wet spring we would like to access all sump pumps in the city to see if it's possible to remove the discharge from the sanitary system. If you have a sump pump that may be connected to the sanitary system or if you're not sure please call Kevin Mumford at the Treatment Plant to set up an appointment for a quick inspection. We can determine where your sump pump discharges and if there's an alternative way to remove it from the sanitary system. Thank you!
